Uruguayan Wines

t's not often that we taste wines from Uruguay, so we thought we'd pass on our impressions of this small batch. White

2021 Bouza Coco Chardonnay-Albariño Peachy, and showing some oak, but it's forward and buttery, resembling many Australian chardonnays of decades ago. $\star \star \star$

2023 Bouza Albariño Rich citrus aromas. The palate offers good fruit weight but it's too firm. $\star \star \star$

2022 Cerro del Toro Albariño Sobre Lias Showing some honeyed development. Has sufficient fruit but is beginning to dry out on the finish. $\star \star \star$

Red

2018 Garzón Single Vineyard Tannat Intense and plummy, with some secondary earthy, sous bois character. Good fruit weight and length. Fine, savoury tannins. (\$45.00 No longer available) ★★★★

2020 Bouza Tannat Las Espinas Deep purple colour. Big, ripe, and plummy. Firm, chewy tannins support plenty of fresh flavour. Needs time. *******

2021 Bouza Tannat Bright purple. Plums and red berries. Firm, with adequate fruit. Shows acidity on the finish. $\star \star \star \star$

2016 Pizzorno Don Prospero Tannat Good colour. Earthy red berry nose. Typical firm tannat palate. Just enough fruit. $\star \star \star \star$

2020 Garzón Tannat Reserva Fresh, slightly candied, red berry. Simple and quite firm. Needs more fruit. (\$29.00) $\star \star \star$

2021 Cerro del Toro Tannat Reserva Red berry, earth/leather. Touch of volatile acidity on nose and palate. Grippy finish. *******
